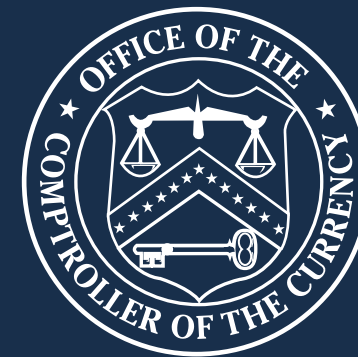

OFFICE OF THE COMPTROLLER OF THE CURRENCY (OCC)

The OCC charters, regulates, and supervises national banks and federal savings associations and supervises the federal branches and agencies of foreign banks. The OCC's mission is to ensure that national banks and federal savings associations operate in a safe and sound manner, provide fair access to financial services, treat customers fairly, and comply with applicable laws and regulations.

The OCC is an independent bureau of the U.S. Department of the Treasury. Headquartered

in Washington, D.C., the OCC employs approximately 3,600 full-time staff members at offices throughout the country.

The OCC's Office of Minority and Women Inclusion (OMWI) is responsible for developing standards for increasing the participation of minority- and women-owned businesses in the OCC's programs and contracts and coordinating technical assistance to minority- and women-owned businesses.

SUPPLIER DIVERSITY AT THE OCC

The OCC is committed to supplier diversity and awarding contracts to qualified small businesses, small disadvantaged businesses, women-owned small businesses, service-disabled veteran-owned small businesses, and HUBZone small businesses. The OCC proudly achieves its annual U.S. Small Business Administration (SBA) small business goals.

The OCC awards an average of \$159 million in contracts annually, representing approximately 600 contracts and nearly 300 contractors. The OCC uses U.S. General Services Administration (GSA) multiple award schedule contracts, government-wide acquisition contracts, and multi-agency contracts for much of its contracting needs. For items not available through multiple award contracts, the OCC posts requests for proposals or quotes on the

System for Award Management (SAM) website: <https://sam.gov/content/home>.

The majority of OCC purchases are in North American Industry Classification System (NAICS) categories related to information technology, including custom computer programming services, computer systems design services, and other computer-related services.

The OCC's Supplier Diversity Program focuses on increasing opportunities for and providing technical assistance to minority- and women-owned businesses. REGISTERING WITH THE OCC
